



Zoom Audition Guidelines

BA (Hons) Popular Music Performance (Drums) & Event Management

This guide will help you prepare for your Zoom Audition or Interview. It is important that you read each section to give yourself the best chance of obtaining a recommendation for the course.

Please also refer to our handy checklist to ensure nothing is missed and you are best prepared.

As a BIMM Institute student you will be creative, collaborative, innovative, professional and continue to push the boundaries of the Music Industry.

What to expect

Auditions/interviews are one to one with a BIMM Institute Assessor and will last 1 hour. This is your opportunity to tell us about you and show your skill set for the course of interest.

There are four parts to your joint honours audition:

1. Performance Audition – Drums
2. Event Management Presentation
3. Drum video(s) & Event Management presentation submission form
4. Theory & Sight Reading

During your audition you will have the opportunity to ask questions about the course, provide details on your musical background such as recording/performance experience, and discuss genres you have a keen interest in. Your assessor will also explore with you what you hope to gain from your studies and discuss your musical aspirations.

1. Performance Audition - Drums (pre-recorded)

You must provide a video of you performing in advance of your appointment. It should be around 3-minutes long and can be an original piece or a cover. Please be sure you select a song that:

- You feel comfortable with
- Demonstrates your technical ability
- Represents you as a performer

Performance to a suitable backing track is preferred. Please ensure this is set in advance and able to be played from a suitable device. The backing track must be a “drum-less” version but may include a click track.

Please let admissions know what equipment you have available. An acoustic or electric kit is preferable but a basic practice pad will suffice. If you have no drum equipment at all, please contact a member of the admissions team **ASAP**.

Styles Knowledge Performance (live OR pre-recorded)

You will be asked to demonstrate your stylistic knowledge across genres. These should be different styles to your prepared piece and do not require a backing track. You can choose which styles you play but try to showcase a different aspect of your playing.

Examples include (but not limited to): **ROCK, POP, BLUES, PUNK, FUNK, SOUL, METAL, REGGAE, LATIN, JAZZ and DRUM & BASS.**

You must pick from **TWO** of the above examples playing each at any preferred tempo for approximately 16 bars each.

Instrument Skills - Technique

Your assessor will ask you to demonstrate the following exercises below. We recommend you become familiar with:

- Single stroke roll (16th notes/semiquavers) - 100-160 bpm (assessor discretion)
- Double stroke roll (16th notes/semiquavers) - 100-140 bpm (assessor discretion)
- Paradiddle (16th notes/semiquavers) - 100-140 bpm (assessor discretion)
- Straight pop groove with metronome at 100bpm OR shuffle groove with metronome at 80bpm

You may also be asked to demonstrate the following:

- Paradiddle-diddle - (assessor discretion)
- Five-stroke roll - (assessor discretion)
- A groove demonstrating use of 4-way coordination (any preferred tempo)

These are not integral to the overall recommendation; however, they can strengthen your audition.

2. Event Management Presentation Preparation

Please prepare a 5-minute presentation covering one of the following topics:

- A current development or issue within the music industry
- A culturally important event or festival: historical or modern day
- A prominent entrepreneur relevant to the music / events industry
- A live music event company
- Present an event you have created or been involved with. Explain your role, how the event was planned and reflect on how it went / what could be improved next time.

The presentation will help create a discussion centre piece for your interview. It is not designed to test your presenting skills, but to encourage thought and conversation which will help determine suitability for the course.

You can deliver your presentation in a way you feel is effective to communicate your thoughts and ideas. For example; PowerPoint, video, a written piece you can talk through, or a series of blogs you have written.

Submitting your Supporting Material - Presentation Piece

Please submit your supporting materials e.g. PowerPoint, Word document, videos through an online sharing platform such as:

- Google Drive
- One Drive
- Dropbox

When your material has been uploaded, please include a link in the below form. You need to complete this by the deadline given to you. Late submissions may not be considered. We cannot download your presentation, please do NOT send us links to WeTransfer or email attachments. Please use the submission form below only.

3. Drum video(s) and Event Management Presentation submission form

You MUST complete the form on page 3. This is where you can provide information and links ready for your zoom audition or interview. Once this has been filled in please double check that the links work. You will then need to save and name the document in capital letters with your full name followed by the word PERFORMANCE

4. Theory & Sight Reading

You will be asked to work through some sight reading and music theory-based exercises in order to gauge your musical knowledge and aptitude.

THEORY - You will be asked to demonstrate your understanding/level of music theory knowledge. If appropriate, you will be asked some questions on time signatures and intervals.

SIGHT READING - You will be asked to demonstrate your understanding/level of notation reading. If appropriate, you will work through a short sight-reading piece with the assessor.

It is important to note that successful completion of your audition **does not** rely on these elements. We look at all aspects presented by applicants when deciding on making the appropriate course recommendation.
